The Future is Now – Tom Scarise, Assistant Superintendent

What types of skills will children need to succeed in today's world? Which skills are most important? What can be done to help schools meet an educational challenge never seen before? Does the traditional promise of "work hard, get good grades, go to a good college, and get a good job" still apply?

Assessment is the most powerful determinant of practice in the classroom. We teach what we test and we value what we measure. Current standardized testing emphasizes core academic skills only. In addition, the methodology is disconnected from real-world application and performance. This practice must not be just retooled; a complete transformation is necessary.

In an effort to accelerate the process of transformative assessment and to teach and to measure the acquisition of 21st century skills in its students, the Weston Public Schools have begun a collaborative project with Columbia University Teachers' College. The goal of this project is to develop and implement a valid and reliable internal assessment framework that measures student achievement of specified, high-priority 21st century skills, competencies, and understandings while also informing and driving classroom instruction and innovation.

View this as a call to action nationally and for our community. Building on the solid foundation of the Weston Public Schools, we can be leaders in the type of

school reform that addresses a complex world growing smaller each day. Our commitment to continuous improvement has given us an opportunity to rise to the next level of excellence and deliver a program that meets the unprecedented challenges of this era.

Recent recipients have been: Sydney Girardi, WHS Visual Arts Teacher, and Dave Eger, WHS Videography teacher.

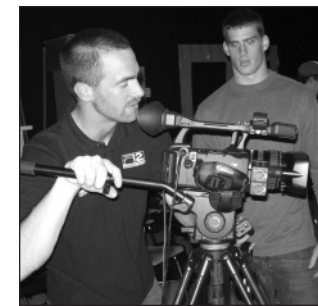

SMART Student Response System



WEF's generous donors make it possible to pilot new programs. Weston Middle School purchased 24 SMART handheld remotes that interface with Smartboards. Students using this equipment provide instant feedback to their teachers, demonstrating what they are learning. This program was successful and WMS will be purchasing additional remotes for the 7th grade.

The Community Education Grant gives Weston-based non-profit organizations the opportunity to apply for up to \$1,500 to develop educational programs to benefit its constituents and/or the residents of the Town of Weston.
